


Arco & Iris in South America

They would have liked to take an aeroplane and fly high and see the rainbow for real because they could see it only in their minds!




They lived in Turin in a Museum all about saving and in the glass case next to theirs there was a beautiful money box shaped like a globe with two funny-looking people sitting in a plane!

One night, without knowing whether it was a dream or a spell, they woke up to find themselves real people... in flesh and blood!!! They could not believe it.




They had often thought long and hard together about where their first journey might be, and after consulting all the atlases and globes in the collection they had decided: they wanted to go to South America!

Happy and excited, they took a taxi to the airport and bought two tickets for Brazil!





Their flight was called... AZ674... and while they were waiting to embark, they saw the pilot get into the cabin.


Iris said to Arco: «He must be a clever person, he's exactly the same as the one in the third case on the left in the right wing in the Museum.»

Then they began their descent: they were almost at their destination. They landed in perfect time at the Antonio Carlos Jobim airport in Rio de Janeiro.



On their way back, they even found some part-time jobs that gave them a discount on a boat heading for Peru.



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
